The 2010 Federal Budget includes \$475 million in funding to the Environmental Protection Agency for environmental restoration of the Great Lakes. Similar amounts of funding are also planned for the next several years. This is called the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative. We are working with Bay, Arenac and Huron Counties on a grant application for septic tank replacement/upgrades and invasive vegetation control for coastal areas around the entire bay. We will need Board action on 1/26/10 to approve the grant application and a letter of support.

Several questions have come up from Tuscola County Commissioners related to the septic system portion of the application. Will all systems near the bay be inspected? If problems are present is upgrading optional or mandatory to the property owner? Would upgrades be 100% grant funded? Would the property owner be responsible for any costs that exceed a per septic system baseline amount if such a baseline amount is established by the grant? Will there be any property owner liability if their current septic have not been functioning properly? If lot size is not adequate for a standard septic system will a more costly system be required and who would have to finance it? Could these changes lead to municipal sewage systems being required?

Perhaps a question and answer sheet needs to be developed prior to requesting approval of the application by respective Boards of Commissioners. It would be beneficial to have a summary of what the application entails and as many specifics that can be answered regarding how the septic system portion of the application will be implemented and how this will impact the property owner. Commissioners in all four counties and in particular those commissioners who represent districts along the bay need to be prepared to answer constituent questions.

The 2010 Federal Budget includes \$475 million in funding to the Environmental Protection Agency for environmental restoration of the Great Lakes. Similar amounts of funding are also planned for the next several years. This has gone from a 5 year program to a 3 year program, the funding has not changed. Still 5 Billion dollars.

This is called the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative. We are working with Bay, Arenac and Huron Counties on a grant application for septic tank replacement/upgrades and invasive vegetation control for coastal areas around the entire bay.

The group has been titled the "BATH", Bay, Arenac, Tuscola, Huron, county group.

We will need Board action on 1/26/10 to approve the grant application and a letter of support.

A very simple resolution stating the the Board of Commissioners appreciates and supports the efforts of those working on the GLRI grant for the counties of Bay, Arenac, Tuscola, and Huron county.

Several questions have come up from Tuscola County Commissioners related to the septic system portion of the application. Will all systems near the bay be inspected? That is the plan but not guaranteed. New homes of course won't require an inspection. We will likely start systems already identified as faulty. Then go with a volunteer approach for those who live along waterways and think their system is faulty. After that anyone could volunteer to participate in the process. Some people are confused about the "Grandfather Clause". There is no Grandfather clause for systems that leak into the waterway...the term their would be guilty.

If problems are present is upgrading optional or mandatory to the property owner?

In order to get funding for a replacement system, the system would have to show that it could be a threat to the waterway/Great Lakes.

Would upgrades be 100% grant funded?

Not sure about upgrades, but a replacement system that meets the needs as stated by the county Health Department would be funded. We are expecting average replacement cost at an average of \$5k each. Remember, this is only for residential property, single family. (at this point) The next round of applications could possibly cover others to include some commercial sites. We will question the EPA to see if they are willing to assist with commercial locations. Also, this is only for the basic cost of replacing the system. This does not mean that the old system will be removed or even addressed. This also does not cover any costs for landscaping or replacement landscaping or loss of tree's.

Would the property owner be responsible for any costs that exceed a per septic system baseline amount if such

a baseline amount is established by the grant?

The BATH committee will have to determine that. I believe anything reasonable would be funded 100%. If we find that someone built on a piece of property that never should have been developed causing the cost to be outrageous, I personally don't feel that should be paid for. Maybe in a case like that funding would be limited to \$5k. Something for the BATH comm to discuss. This is likely something that could be determined prior to contracting with the landowner to have their septic system inspected. Will there be any property owner liability if their current septic have not been functioning properly? Our current discussions, my opinion is no. We want to find these problem systems and get them replaced. Would recommend that we adopt that as an official policy of the BATH comm. Now if the property owner agree's to an inspection and the system is found faulty and they don't want the system replaced...now they deal with the county health department.

If lot size is not adequate for a standard septic system will a more costly system be required and who would have to finance it?

Something we have discussed and we have looked at and will propose new technology where property owners in an area that do not have the room for a single residence system may possibly be able to share a multi-home system. For example, we have 10 single family residents in a row and not one of the properties has the room..we could propose engineering a multi-home system at a cost similar to an individual system, such as \$5k per home, a \$50k system. Now, if that system would later require scheduled pumping, electric, operator fee's...the home owners would likely have to form an association and have to agree by contract that they would all participate. The legal costs would not be covered to draft the agreement. We are only paying for testing, engineering, replacement.

Could these changes lead to municipal sewage systems being required?

Your health department director should know where a municipal system is "required". This will not fund municipal systems. Although....we have discussed and support the option to pay for the hookup of homes to existing municipal systems. Again, the septic system must be faulty and impact the Great Lakes in order to qualify.

Perhaps a question and answer sheet needs to be developed prior to requesting approval of the application by respective Boards of Commissioners. It would be beneficial to have a summary of what the application entails and as many specifics that can be answered regarding how the septic system portion of the application will be implemented and how this will impact the property owner. Commissioners in all four counties and in particular those commissioners who represent districts along the bay need to be prepared to answer constituent questions.

RESOLUTION

RE: SUPPORT OF THE FINAL REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION ON STATUTORY MANDATES, DECEMBER 2009

WHEREAS, the electorate of the State of Michigan passed an amendment in November 1978 to the State's Constitution that required the State to fund mandates imposed on local units of government (often referred to as the "Headlee Amendment"); and

WHEREAS, the Headlee Amendment (Article IX, Section 29) states:

"The state is hereby prohibited from reducing the state financed proportion of the necessary costs of any existing activity or service required of units of Local Government by state law. A new activity or service or an increase in the level of any activity or service beyond that required by existing law shall not be required by the Legislature or any state agency of units of Local Government, unless a state appropriation is made and disbursed to pay the unit of Local Government for any necessary increased costs. The provision of this section shall not apply to costs incurred pursuant to Article VI, Section 18." and;

WHEREAS, the Headlee Amendment became effective on December 23, 1978; and

WHEREAS, the State Legislature established the Legislative Commission on Statutory Mandates (LCSM) through P.A. 98 of 2007, as amended by P.A. 356 of 2008 and assigned the LCSM to identify mandates (including those involving reports) and the related cost of the mandates to local units of government, along with recommendations to resolve the unfunded mandates; and

WHEREAS, the LCSM worked with the Citizens Research Council (issued an analysis of other state's statutes and constitutional requirements similar to the Headlee Amendment) and local units of government associations, including:

- Michigan Association of Counties.
- Michigan Municipal League.
- Michigan Township Association.
- Michigan School Business Officials and Michigan Association of School Administrators
- Michigan Community College Association.
- County Road Association of Michigan.

WHEREAS, the LCSM issued a report in June 2009 entitled "Interim Report of the Legislative Commission on Statutory Mandates" that indicated, among other matters, that the State had failed to enact legislation enabling the Headlee Amendment and has not complied with the Headlee Amendment since its adoption in 1978; and

WHEREAS, the LCSM has completed its report in December 2009 entitled "Final Report of the Legislative Commission on Statutory Mandates" that reaffirms the Interim Report results and provides recommendations, including but not limited to:

- Drafted legislation and court rules that would mitigate unfunded mandates imposed on local units of government in the future.
- Proposed procedures that will prevent new unfunded mandates from being imposed on local units of government.
- Proposed procedures that would be corrective should unfunded mandates be imposed that include, among other requirements:
 - A submission of an action before the Court of Appeals to be heard by a special master in order to rule on whether the matter is a mandate and if the mandate is underfunded.
 - o Require the Court of Appeals to rule on the above within six months of the filing.
 - o Should the Court of Appeals not rule on the above within six months, the local unit of government would have no obligation to continue to provide the services until such time as the State complies with the Headlee Amendment.

WHEREAS, the Michigan Association of Counties adopted a resolution of support for the recommendations contained in the final LCSM report in December 2009.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners supports the findings and recommendations in the interim and final reports of the Legislative Commission on Statutory Mandates and encourages the Governor, Legislature and Supreme Court to adopt and enact the recommendations cited in the final report.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners approves the release of this resolution to be distributed to the Governor, Legislators, Supreme Court and local units of government legislative boards and executives located within Tuscola County.

Mandate report should embarrass state

"A new activity or service or an increase in the level of any activity or service beyond that required by existing law shall not be required by the legislature or any state agency of units of Local Government, unless a state appropriation is made and disbursed to pay the unit of Local Government for any necessary increased costs."

> That's some of the key language of the Headlee Amendment, a constitutional change made by the voters 30 years ago to put controls on state government.

A new report, ordered by the Legislature, says not only is the state failing to abide by the Headlee directive, it has buried local schools and governments in at least \$2.2 billion in unfunded mandates.

The actual figure could be even higher, as the commission's final report admitted: "The underfunding only for those mandates for which the Commission could deduce credible estimates is between \$2.2 billion and \$2.5 billion in 2009 alone" (emphasis original).

"The result of this chronic non-compliance," said the commission's interim report, "is that for over 30 years the State has systematically transferred to local governments the responsibility for various functions, some of which are worthy activities or services, but which the State has not wanted to pay for, in direct contravention of the Headlee Amendment."

This isn't professional incompetence, but arrogance. Governor after governor, Legislature after Legislature has ignored the Headlee directive for the simple reason that they haven't faced any personal consequences for it.

As the commission details, the state has been sued from time to time over facets of this failure. The lengthy Durant litigation over special education is one such expensive example. But even when the state loses, nothing is done to the political leaders who choose to do as they please.

In its report, the commission includes draft legislation to have the state do what Headlee orders it to do. Unfortunately, that legislation would have to be approved by the same lawmakers who have found it convenient not to comply with Headlee.

The only real cause for optimism here is the commission and its report. They are the result of legislative action to study the problem. It's highly unlikely that any voters would have taken umbrage if lawmakers had chosen not to look at this mess. So, maybe, just maybe, there could be a moment to advance reforms.

It will require, however, state leaders who are willing to turn to voters and say they either have to pay more for the services they are getting, or expect to see local governments and schools shed themselves of these mandates, be they worthy or not.

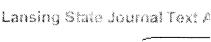

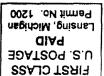
