# 2011 Annual Report

Region VII Area Agency on Aging is very proud to participate in an aging network that ensures that our most vulnerable population, the elderly and disabled, will have a better tomorrow and quality of life they so truly deserve. It is through the efforts, dedication and support of our Staff, Board of Directors, Advisory Council, and with the collaboration of our service providers and community agencies, that we are able to provide the assistance that this population requires to live independent and with dignity in the environment of their choice.

Advocacy for the elderly and disabled is of utmost concern. This past year again proved to be very challenging, both at the local and state levels. The Agency developed and continues to coordinate, the Senior Advisory Group (SAG) which currently has over 100 advocates, and also developed a quarterly newsletter "The Senior Advisor" and a Blog "http://thesenioradvisor.wordpress.com/", for disseminating and receiving information for advocacy purposes. The fourth annual "Older Michiganians Day" (OMD) event was held on June 15, 2011 at the State Capital. The theme for OMD was "The Senior WAVE" and highlighted an advocacy platform: to invest in results-oriented solutions that make optimal use of public dollars; to enact legislation that promotes a stronger Michigan economy through the Aging Network; and to protect vulnerable older adults by passing Elder Abuse Laws. It is through advocacy that we have the ability to educate our communities and legislators regarding senior related issues.

Highlighting this past year, Region VII's Information and Assistance Program received a 95% approval rating from consumers that the information they received about community resources and programs were helpful. Our Medicare & Medicaid Assistance Program (MMAP) assisted 6,346 people with their Medicare and/or Medicaid questions. The Senior Community Service Employment Program transitioned 10 trainees into unsubsidized employment. The Medicaid Waiver Program, which affords clients the ability to remain in their homes maintaining a sense of independence and dignity, served 571 clients of which 115 were nursing home transitions. The Care Management Program assisted an additional 308 clients to remain at home with limited assistance, and the OSA contracted and purchase of service program was able to assist 36,431 seniors, 60 and older, with their service needs. The Personal Action Towards Health (PATH) Program trained 47 people on how to deal with their chronic health diseases. The Creating Confident Caregiver Program using the Savvy Caregiver Method trained 207 caregivers of dementia people to learn, develop, and modify strategies that will be used to accomplish the goal for their particular caregiving situation. Region VII implemented the Matter of Balance Program which helps people reduce their fear of falling, stopping the fear of falling cycle, and improving their activity levels in their community. The Aging and Disability Resource Center of the Thumb was approved by OSA and is in its early stages of implementation. Region VII was also able to utilize local funding to provide assistance to 501 older adults with Unmet Needs - Home Repair, Slip/Fall/Safety and utility assistance.

Region VII continues to promote programs and services throughout our ten counties by advertising, signage, developing educational media CD's, attending county collaborative bodies, distributing media releases, presentations to community organizations and on public television, attending senior health fairs and events, conducting speaking engagements, and sponsoring/co-sponsoring informational events.

In closing, Region VII is committed to building and maintaining strong partnerships which benefit older adults and persons with disabilities, and to advocate for programs and services that will best fulfill their needs.
