
We're going to replace old copper line telephones that we pay about \$41 per month, each. The new phones are going to utilize one big phone line (PRI/ISDN) to dial into and out of, resulting in SIGNIFICANT savings.


We've tested this in smaller applications. We've already realized savings in the Annex, TCSO and Purdy.

The Courthouse is going to be our biggest challenge and biggest realization of savings.

On June 22, 2015, Mr. Tom Young from the Michigan Department of Agriculture & Rural Development (MDARD) visited your farm located at 4704 East Gilford Road, Deford, Michigan, to verify your farming operation through the Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program (MAEAP). This visit was made at your request to complete the verification requirements of the MAEAP Farmstead System. Your MAEAP verification risk assessment was completed by Mr. Steve Schaub, with the Tuscola Conservation District.

After reviewing your Farmstead Improvement Action Plan and the required components of your Farm*A*Syst, MDARD staff has verified that you have met all of the requirements set forth by the MAEAP Farmstead System at the time of the farm inspection.

The MAEAP Farmstead System verification is valid for five years from the date of the farm visit. This verification is approved on the basis that you have disclosed to the best of your knowledge, all requested information pertaining to your Farmstead Improvement Action Plan. We understand that you intend to manage the Farmstead as reviewed and follow the applicable Generally Accepted Agricultural and Management Practices (GAAMPs). Changes in your farming operation may necessitate a review of your Farm*A*Syst.

Verification in good standing is contingent on updates as necessary as conditions change on your farm as well as staying in compliance with applicable state and federal laws and following the identified MAEAP standards. BY: WHEREAS,	BAY COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS The Michigan Tax Tribunal has interpreted the law for tax assessments in a way that dramatically reduces the property tax liabilities of major "big box" retailers by assessing currently used buildings as though they are empty and dark; and
WHEREAS,	Under the "dark store' theory, big box stores are appealing their property tax assessments to the Michigan Tax Tribunal (MTT), arguing that the fair market value of their operating store should be based on comparisons to sales of similar properties that are vacant and abandoned, or are now used for a different, less valuable purpose; and
WHEREAS,	The Michigan Tax Tribunal has upheld this theory and cut property tax assessments by as much as 50 percent and, as a result, townships and local units are losing millions of dollars, impacting services to their residents; and
WHEREAS,	Additionally, big box stores are putting deed restrictions on their properties that severely limit how the building can be used once it's vacant resulting in buildings being kept empty and adding to the blight problem in Michigan townships; and
WHEREAS,	The issue is already spreading to restaurants, apartment complexes, auto part stores and many other businesses and, without action, the problem will only get worse; and
WHEREAS,	The reduction of property tax liabilities creates huge cuts in the funding to state and local units of government like cities, counties, townships and school districts; and
WHEREAS,	The decisions of the Michigan Tax Tribunal are a catastrophic departure from the tax assessment process required by law and all precedents in the matter, once again reducing the rightful tax to businesses and the wealthy, thus, once again, placing the tax burden on the poor and middle class; Therefore, Be it

MAC ISSUE SUMMARY

House Bill 5578 creates fair, equitable solution to Dark Stores crisis

Starting in about 2013, "Big Box" retailers (Meijer, Home Depot, Target, etc.) convinced the Michigan Tax Tribunal to deviate from traditional practice in valuing property and rely on the "sales approach," a shift that has become known as the "Dark Stores" theory.

Under this theory of valuation, an operating store's value is built off comparable structures – even if said structures are vacant. Dark Stores appeals have distorted Michigan's property tax system, with Big Box retailers in our state enjoying per square foot values of about \$20, regardless of the size of the store or the type of products being sold.

HB 5578 by Rep. David Maturen (R-Kalamazoo County) would block the Dark Stores technique.

- By requiring the Tax Tribunal to consider all methods of assessing property, HB
 5578 sets up a fair and equitable system of property review.
- HB 5578 enforces current law by clarifying that Tax Tribunal members must independently evaluate the parties' stipulation as to any valuation method or issue.
- The bill limits the use of deed restrictions to prevent the Dark Stores technique of using vacant, restricted properties for the sole purpose of artificially lowering value.
- The bill details in law the four-part tests that appraisers use to determine the highest and best use of property.
- HB 5578 is consistent with state law defining a property's "true cash value."
- The bill does not impose any new requirements on assessors or appraisers.
