Hello,

Quick update. The Drug Task Force did meet last Thursday and we have a draft of "Resource Toolbox for Opioid and Heroin Awareness almost completed. One final page is at the prosecutor's office waiting for input. List Psychological Services has some prevention dollars that can be used for printing. The resource toolkit will be made available for physicians, dentists, healthcare professionals, general community as a quick resource guide for families. The next toolbox will have additional pages added for prevention and resources for parents, most likely be completed next month. Rack Cards, like bookmarks, will also be printed with local resources and set out for the public.

FAN-Families Against Narcotics?? We need families or people committed to recovery to show an interest to take this on. It's nice that they offer "Hope to Handcuffs", but the Drug Task Force felt that not too many people with addiction would be willing to turn to the police department for assistance. There is a cost to starting a FAN and the Drug Task Force did not feel like they wanted to take this on, especially since it is another group that we would have to fund raise every year for. The startup cost of \$1200-\$1500 and every year an ongoing cost of \$1000.00. The State Police offer the Angel Program and that is also available to us without becoming a FAN Chapter. I am not against FAN, I think it is a great idea but you need to have committed recovery folks involved and currently we have one person. I spoke with Mark Willis from Anchor Cove Church and they already have a recovery group that meets every Friday Night, and he was not really eager to take on FAN either right now. His recovery group will be reviewing our toolkit and letting us know what else needs to be added.

I am meeting with Livingston County to discuss their treatment processes, currently Tuscola County does not have an actual treatment option for addicts. I have members from Huron and Sanilac Counties who are also interested in meeting with us.

We actually have 44 Drug Task Force members, anywhere from 27-33 have been attending the meetings. The next meeting is not until October, due to scheduling issues. It is hard to get that many people to agree on a date. Very committed group, really pleased with the discussions. WE have physicians, nurses, MSP, Sherriff, Education, substance abuse and counseling providers, parents, Mental Health, Child Advocacy, pharmacists, plus many more! We meet for two hours only 8:30 start promptly and end at 10:30am.

Things we will have outcomes for by October 19th meeting:

- Toolkits will be done and some printed and the digital version should be ready to post on websites of the community based organizations
- Sherriff is working with List Psychological on Drug Take back issues including drug drop off locations in the local police stations
- 3. Exploring options for a treatment center and funding avenues
- 4. Still discussing the FAN option and will be very supportive in assisting families in starting a chapter. (Huron and Sanilac are just starting up their chapters. Huron has asked permission to use our toolkit and tweak it to their community)
- 5. Provider Education! I will be working with Mid-state who is our community Substance Abuse Prevention Network on getting us examples of materials that we can use with our physician, and dentists to raise awareness of the narcotic use in our county for which they contribute to every time they write a prescription. This is actually been a request from some of our local providers.

I think this enough to keep us busy until October.

If you need anything for have further questions please do not hesitate to call. The attached is a draft, there are a couple of typos we need to fix and also the page from the prosecutor's office yet.

TO THE HONORABLE CHAIRPERSON AND MEMBERS OF THE [COUNTY NAME] COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, [COUNTY NAME], MICHIGAN

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

WHEREAS, the collection of delinquent real property taxes and the administration of the delinquent tax revolving fund by the county treasurer under The General Property Tax, 1893 PA 206, as amended, MCL 211.1 to 211.157, is important in assuring that [COUNTY NAME] (the "County") and local tax collecting units within the County actually receive taxes levied in a timely manner, that tax delinquent properties in the County are returned to productive use, and that a favorable credit rating for the County is maintained;

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 386 of 2017, as passed by the Michigan Senate ("SB 386") would undermine the process for collecting delinquent real property taxes by: (1) increasing, litigation against the county treasurer, allowing anyone to challenge a court-ordered property tax foreclosure for eight new reasons, even a person with no legal interest in the property; (2) clouding title to court-foreclosed properties, reducing sale proceeds used to reimburse local tax collecting units for unpaid property taxes and reducing delinquent tax revolving fund revenue; and (3) creating uncertainty through retroactivity and interference with a pending case before the Michigan Supreme Court;

WHEREAS, by allowing new collateral attacks on judicial foreclosure orders after the orders are final and appeal rights exhausted, SB 386 would undermine the quality of the fee simple title vested in the foreclosing governmental unit, cloud otherwise clear titles, create uncertainty, and reduce prices paid for tax-foreclosed properties at tax sales, all of which undermine the current effective tax sale and delinquent tax collection process;

WHEREAS, for these reasons, the Michigan Association of Counties, the Michigan Association of County Treasurers, and the county treasurer of this County have indicated their opposition to the passage and enactment of SB 386; and

Senate Bill 386—Serious Problems

County treasurers throughout Michigan oppose Senate Bill 386.

Senate Bill 386 is **overbroad**, addressing far more than the principal residence exemption issue claimed by its proponent, and would undermine the process for collecting unpaid real property taxes administered by foreclosing government units (county treasurers and the State of Michigan) for 3 main reasons:

- it would increase litigation, allowing anyone to challenge a court-ordered property tax foreclosure for 8 new reasons, even a person with no legal interest in the tax-foreclosed property;
- it would cloud title to court-foreclosed properties, reducing sale proceeds used to reimburse local tax collecting units for unpaid taxes, interest, penalties, and fees; and
- it would create uncertainty through retroactivity and interfere with a pending court
 case before the Michigan Supreme Court.

Increased Litigation

- SB 386 would permit any "person claiming to have a property interest" in property foreclosed by a court for nonpayment of property taxes (whether the person has an actual interest or not) to ask a circuit court to "invalidate the foreclosure" [SB 386, p 5-6]. This is in addition to the existing right under current law to appeal a foreclosure ordered by a circuit court to the Michigan Court of Appeals [MCL 211.78k(7)].
- SB 386 would create 8 new reasons (already 6 under current law) to undo a courtordered property tax foreclosure by allowing any person claiming an interest in the foreclosed property to "seek to invalidate the foreclosure on any of the grounds" described in Michigan Court Rule 2.612 [SB 386, p 6].
- Among the 8 new reasons under MCR 2.612: failure to personally serve a defendant. This
 is problematic because under state law, tax foreclosures are proceedings against the land
 (in rem) not proceedings against individual property owners or taxpayers as defendants.
- Also among the 8 new reasons: a judge may grant overturn a foreclosure order for "any
 other reason justifying relief". This grants judges very broad discretion to invalidate prior
 circuit court orders for any reason, creating an open invitation for judicial activism and
 legislating from the bench.

Clouded Title, Reduced Tax Sale Proceeds

By allowing new collateral attacks on a foreclosure order after the order is final and appeal rights exhausted, SB 386 would undermine the quality of the fee simple title vested in a foreclosing governmental unit by a foreclosure order, create uncertainty, cloud otherwise clear titles, and reduce prices paid for tax-foreclosed properties at auction, all of which undermine the current tax sale and delinquent tax collection process.

Retroactivity

SB 386 would apply retroactively to January 1, 2015. [SB 386, p 9], which could negatively impact and undermine all property tax foreclosures in the State of Michigan entered in 2015, 2016, and 2017, and in future years.

Interference with Pending Michigan Supreme Court Case

- This legislation is an attempt to alter the outcome of a case currently before the Michigan Supreme Court. See Isabella Co Treasurer v Estate of Timothy Scott Pung (In re Petition of Isabella Co Treasurer), leave to appeal filed with Supreme Court on May 30, 2017 (Docket No. 155846).
- On behalf of the estate, Mr. Michael Pung (the estate's personal representative) wants the Supreme Court to review a recent decision of the Michigan Court of Appeals, which was decided against Mr. Pung and the Estate. See Isabella Co Treasurer v Estate of Timothy Scott Pung (In re Petition of Isabella Co Treasurer), unpublished opinion per curiam of the Court of Appeals, issued April 18, 2017 (Docket No. 329858): publicdocs.courts.mi.gov/opinions/final/coa/20170418_c329858_36_329858.opn.pdf.
- Apparently dissatisfied by the Court of Appeals decision, Mr. Pung both appealed to the Supreme Court on May 30, 2017 and then testified in support of the SB 386 as its main proponent before the Senate Finance Committee on June 8, 2017.
- According to Court, the Pung estate was provided constitutionally sufficient notice of the foreclosure of property for failure to pay property taxes for the 2012 tax year:
 - "Our review of the record reflects that petitioner mailed four notices to Michael's [Pung's] address, 5475 Blue Heron, and two notices to the subject property, 3176 St. Andrews Drive, and physically posted notice at the subject property. None of these notices were returned as undeliverable, and there is no indication that petitioner had any reason to believe that an address other than these two would have proved any more successful. In fact, petitioner had used these same addresses with success during previous litigation with respondent, e.g., the litigation involving the 2010 and 2011 tax years, and it was these addresses to which the 2012 tax bill and revised tax bill were successfully sent. In our view, petitioner had no reason to believe that the notices that were sent or delivered were not being received by respondent. Courts have long held that when a government sends notice and receives no indication in response that something has gone awry, which is precisely the case here, the notice is constitutionally valid. See, e.g., Jones, 547 US at 226. We therefore conclude that the notice provided to respondent by petitioner was constitutionally sufficient." [emphasis added].
- The legislature should avoid intervening in this pending case. In 2015, when the Court of Appeals resolved matters relating to a principal residence exemption in favor of the Pung estate for the 2007 to 2011 tax years, the Isabella County Treasurer let that decision stand, and did not appeal to the Supreme Court or seek retroactive legislation.

WHEREAS, proceedings have been taken by the Tuscola County Drain Commissioner for the construction of improvements to the Yax North Drain (the "Project") under the provisions of Chapter 8 of the Drain Code of 1956, as amended, pursuant to a petition filed with the Drain Commissioner; and

I was going to stop in and talk to you about a couple of bills that have been introduced in both the Senate and House that pertains to Central Dispatch funding. I would like to request a resolution from the Board of Commissioners in support of these bills. I have attached a draft copy of a resolutions, for your review. If everything looks o.k., would you add it to the board agenda for August 31, 2017?

I have cc'd the board of commissioners as well, as I have also attached the bills for which this resolution refers to. I wanted to assure everyone has time to review them, should they choose, prior to the meeting. Unless there is some procedural order that I am not aware of, the bills do not have to be included in the agenda. You will also find attached a listing of the key changes and reasons for the changes.

Lastly, at our last meeting on July 18, 2017 the Authority Board reviewed all this information and approved supporting these bills.

We need support for these bills for the following reasons:

- · Beginning as early as the end of this year, the current funding mechanism will not be able to cover all 911 wireless network infrastructure costs.
- The migration to Next Generation 911 infrastructure and IP is critical and necessary for the safety of our citizens and communities. The cost for this migration cannot be covered by the existing state 911 surcharge rate and out-of-date prepaid wireless remittance.
- These changes will provide for stable funding and allow continued movement to a redundant, reliable, and robust 911 network and infrastructure that is capable of providing increased accuracy for caller locations in three dimensions and processing text, video, and photos from caller in need of public safety response.
- · We need statutory change to achieve parity for prepaid wireless devices by adjusting the average revenue per unit (ARPU) and to take into account the current weighted average of local and state surcharge.
- ·We need statutory change to allow enforcement and ensure remittance of revenue.
- ·Without these changes, there will be significant impact on local budgets and operations. We have a responsibility to the safety of our communities and our public safety responders to ensure that modern networks and infrastructure are in place to ensure every call for help is answered.

Key changes included in the legislative framework based on the State 911 Committee's (SNC) recommendations:

- The creation of a definition for IP-based 911 service providers. The references in the statute to 911 providers do not address the changing technology of digital-IP based 911 system providers.
- 2) Increase the State 911 fee from \$0.19 to \$0.25.
- 3) Adjust the amount collected by retailers from 1.92% to 4.19%. This keeps prepaid contributions equitable with the changing State 911 fee and reflects the change in average revenue per unit (ARPU) from the \$50 ARPU that was used in 2006 to the current ARPU of \$26.94 in 2015. The 4.19% is calculated using the current weighted average of \$0.88+\$0.25 = \$1.13/\$26.94 = 4.19%.
- 4) Increase the county board of commissioner levy from \$0.42 to \$0.55. The maximum amount a county board of commissioners can levy without having to go to a ballot has remained at \$0.42 since 2008.
- 5) Allow for change in a 911 service provider to a county's 911 plan by a board resolution. This allows a county to modify its 911 plan, while not requiring the time-consuming and potentially costly process of a formal 911 plan opening, yet still makes a public record of the change.
- Provides the State 911 Committee with standing to take legal action if 911 fees are not paid into the fund. The current law does not include a provision to specifically allow the state to bring an action for non-billing, noncollection, or non-payment of the 911 fee. In 2013, the SNC brought an action before the MPSC for non-payment of the state 911 fee by a prepaid provider. An administrative judge held that the SNC does not have legal standing to take action on behalf of the state 911 fund to bring an action for non-payment of 911 fees.

- 7) Change auditing to require counties, not just PSAPs, to ascertain auditing of 911 funds is conducted. The State 911 Fund audit by the Office of the Auditor General changed to a biennial cycle, rather than an annual one.
- 8) Create a fund (I-Fund) that allows the SNC to approve payment for IP-based 911 network costs that meet standards for redundancy, security, and reliability.
- 9) Change the distribution of the State 911 fee to reflect increased costs for NG911. Also creates a "spillover" provision requiring any revenue in excess of \$37 million to be directed to the I-Fund. The distribution levels are reflected below.

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Estimated annual prepaid at 4.19% = $18.4m annually
Estimated annual postpaid at $0.25 = $26.4m annually
Total annual estimate = $44.8m annually

WHEREAS, Michigan House Bill 4651 and Senate Bill 400 have been introduced in the Michigan Legislature, which would amend Public Act 32 of 1986 entitled the "Emergency Telephone Service Enabling Act"; and

WHEREAS, these bills would amend the funding system for 9-1-1 so that all communication devices that have access to 9-1-1, including prepaid wireless devices, contribute equally to the funding of 9-1-1 operations; and

WHEREAS, these bills provide a stable funding source for the counties to support their migration to Next Generation 9-1-1 and ongoing operational levels of service for 9-1-1 to its residents; and

WHEREAS, these bills afford the State and Counties collecting 9-1-1 fees a mechanism for court action should any service providers fail to collect and remit the fees; and

WHEREAS, these bills have a mechanism that provides the necessary checks and balances to ensure revenues generated are used for authorized expenditures for 9-1-1 services; and

WHEREAS, these authorized expenditures are limited to those directly related to receiving and processing 9-1-1 calls and the subsequent dispatching of responders via a public safety radio; and

WHEREAS, such limitation of expenditures has historically met the criteria established through the courts to define 9-1-1 surcharge as a fee for service directly related to telephone services; and

WHEREAS, any attempt to amend House Bill 4651 and Senate Bill 400 for other State of Michigan general fund purposes not directly related to 9-1-1 may not meet the criteria of a fee for service and could be viewed as a tax increase for the residents of Tuscola County, and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners does hereby offer our support of House Bill 4651 and Senate Bill 400 as introduced; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners apposes amending House Bill 4651 and Senate Bill 400 to include any additional State of Michigan taxes on telephone service customers under the guise of 9-1-1 surcharge; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be transmitted to Governor Richard Snyder, and all Senators and Representatives serving Tuscola County.

Outcomes for the Month:

1. County Drug Task Force Meeting: The third meeting will be held on August 17. a) Opioid Toolhox: A subcommittee has been working on a "toolbox of resources" The toolbox would widely be available to all health care providers, dentists, other health care providers along with families, and those directly affected by this issue. A first draft will be ready for the August 17th meeting. If it is approved then it will go to print. We will have it ready for digital use on agency websites by October 17, 2017.

Third meeting is scheduled for August 17, 8:30-10:30 am Location: Medical Care Annex Building, White Pine Conference Room

- 2. <u>CDC NHANES Survey:</u> CDC is here, they are set up in the Health Department parking lot. They did have an open house on August 8th.
- 3. <u>Immunization Mini-grant</u>: Huron County Health Department did receive a \$70,000 MCIR Immunization mini grant on behalf of the Michigan Thumb Public Health Alliance (MTPH). The grant is for immunization outreach for children and adults. All four counties in the Alliance will be working together to complete the work plan objectives. No match was required for this grant.
- 4. <u>Veterans Affairs:</u> Office is busy 5 days a week. Mark and Ana cover each other so that the office always has someone available. Encourage appointments over walk-ins. Although walk-ins are accepted they may need to wait for assistance, while those who have appointments are being served. The office has its own waiting room in the front lobby where they can comfortably wait.

The Tuscola County Veteran's Committee needs to fill at a minimum one of the vacancies on the Veterans Committee due to a recent resignation. The legislation for this Committee states they need to have 3-7 members, currently there are two members. There is specific criterion that must be utilized when appointing these members. The criteria are currently be drafted so that qualified applicants may be recommended to the Board of Commissioner for appointment. A request for posting of these positions will be forthcoming to the County Clerk within the next few weeks.

The power washing on the Courthouse caused a lot of water to leak into places that normally do not see water when normal rain comes. This included the inside of the circuit panel to backdoor of the courthouse. That board is fried and replacement parts are not available.

The plan is to have the entire system replaced by ESCON for significantly less than our original estimate. This will not be replaced this week as ESCON will need to order supplies. Our goal is to have it replaced and existing keys working by the end of next week. Maintenance will have a very limited amount of keys to the back door. Those keys will be provided to the Court Administrators.

The original quote to replace the existing equipment was \$17,500. ESCON has given us a preliminary estimate of sub \$5,000. I told them to proceed ordering equipment and schedule the repair as soon as possible, per our phone conversation today.

The Corrections Officers in the Sheriff's Office have a key to the back door. They have been notified of the problem and are ready to respond accordingly, if needed.
