

We believe this is the best approach to providing needed mental health services in Michigan while maintaining and providing for the economic health of one of Michigan's underserved regions.

Resolution No. 2019-67

SUPPORTING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW STATE PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITAL IN TUSCOLA COUNTY TO REPLACE THE CURRENT CARO CENTER FACILITY

WHEREAS, Since the 1990's, the number of state psychiatric beds in Michigan decreased by nearly 50%, forcing acute or chronically disabled psychiatric individuals to hospital emergency rooms and jails and sometimes, homeless situations; and

WHEREAS, Emergency service providers including law enforcement personnel find serving people in acute psychiatric crisis creating growing demands on their resources and facilities; and

WHEREAS, Multiple studies conclude there is a pressing need for long-term, inpatient psychiatric care in Michigan; and

WHEREAS, The State Legislature responded to this crisis by providing \$115 million in state building authority financed construction for a new state psychiatric hospital to be built on the grounds of the current Caro Center which was signed into law through Public Act 107 of 2017; and

WHEREAS, The State Administrative Board approved a \$5.4 million contract to design a new, 200-bed, regional state psychiatric hospital on the site of the existing Caro Center, increasing the number of beds to 350; and

WHEREAS, In 2018, a ground-breaking for the new 225,000 square- foot state psychiatric hospital at the site of the current Caro Center was held, foretelling the opening of the new facility in 2021 replacing the aging Caro facility; and

WHEREAS, Over \$3 million in taxpayer funds have already been spent in preparation for construction at the Caro site; and

WHEREAS, In March 2019, Governor Whitmer halted construction, and contracted with a private consulting firm, at the cost of \$277,000, to re-assess the location of a new state psychiatric facility, potentially delaying the availability of new psychiatric beds and the replacement of the aging Caro facility by another 2-4 years; and

WHEREAS, The facility is vital for this entire region of Michigan, including the City of Frankenmuth, as the existing facility infuses an estimated \$54 million annually into the regional economy while directly employing 350 people and indirectly employing another 400 people; and, relocation of the facility would have devastating negative repercussions to businesses, schools and families living in communities throughout this region of the state; and

WHEREAS, At the current location, Seventy percent (70%) of employees travel less than 30 miles to work; and, the site is centrally located and accessible to state highways and area medical providers for patient transportation and family visits with 80% of patients coming from Genesee, Oakland and Macomb Counties, just to the south of Tuscola County; and, the 600-acre site is already state-owned and infrastructure is already in place; and, Tuscola County engineers determined the on-site water system can be economically upgraded to serve the new hospital; and

WHEREAS, Building the new facility on the site of the current Caro Center is best for the individuals needing inpatient psychiatric care and for the taxpayers of Michigan.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Frankenmuth does hereby urge Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Department of Health and Human Services Director Robert Gordon, and members of the State Legislature, in response to a critical shortage of inpatient state psychiatric beds, continue with the construction of a new 200-bed, state psychiatric hospital on the grounds of the current Caro Center, in Tuscola County, as the best option for quality, accessible services to patients and their families, and as the best value to the taxpayers of Michigan and prevent devastating negative repercussions to businesses, schools and families living in communities throughout this region of the state; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be transmitted to Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Department of Health and Human Services Director Robert Gordon, State Senator Kevin Daley, and State Representative Phil Green and Tuscola County administrators.

At a regular meeting of the Frankenmuth Economic Development Corporation Board of Directors on June 20, 2019, the members voted (unanimously) to support this resolution. The motion was made by Vickie Schmitzer and seconded by Joe Cramer.

Present at the meeting were: Mike Grossi, Joe Cramer, Mike Fassezke, Tamara Tsulaia, Beth Reindel, Chris Rittmueller, Vickie Schmitzer, Terry Weiss, Jamie Furbush and Abby Curtis

WHEREAS, Since the 1990's, the number of state psychiatric beds in Michigan decreased by nearly 50%, yet the needs of persons with acute psychosis continue, often evidenced through emergency room visits, jail sentences and homelessness; and

WHEREAS, Emergency service providers including law enforcement personnel struggle with meeting the growing demands on their resources and facilities by assisting those in acute psychiatric crisis; and

WHEREAS, The State Legislature responded to this crisis providing \$115 million in state building authority financed construction funds for a new state psychiatric hospital to be built on the grounds of the current Caro Center as signed into law through Public Act 107 of 2017; and

WHEREAS, The State Administrative Board approved a \$5.4 million a design contract for a new, 200-bed, regional state psychiatric hospital on the site of the existing Caro Center, increasing the number of beds to 350; and a State-sponsored ground breaking event was held in 2018, foretelling the opening of the new facility by 2021 replacing the aging Caro facility; and

WHEREAS, Prior to the expense of any funds, State Administrators had vetted the site as acceptable as 70% of current employees travel less than 30 miles to work; the site's central location makes it accessible to state highways for patient transportation to area medical providers and for family visits; that 80% of current patients come from Genesee, Oakland and Macomb Counties, just to the south of Tuscola County and within an average 90 minute drive or less; the 600-acre site is already state-owned and infrastructure is already in place; and, Tuscola County engineers determined the on-site water system can be economically upgraded to improve service to the new hospital; and

WHEREAS, More than \$3 million in taxpayer funds have already been spent in preparation for construction at the Caro site; and

WHEREAS, In March 2019, Construction was halted on the facility and the State contracted with a private consulting firm, at the cost of \$277,000, to re-assess the location of the new state psychiatric facility, potentially delaying the availability of improved psychiatric services including provision of new beds and the replacement of the aging Caro facility by another 2-4 years; and

WHEREAS, The State Legislature responded to this crisis providing \$115 million in state building authority financed construction funds for a new state psychiatric hospital to be built on the grounds of the current Caro Center as signed into law through Public Act 107 of 2017; and

WHEREAS, The State Administrative Board approved a \$5.4 million a design contract for a new, 200-bed, regional state psychiatric hospital on the site of the existing Caro Center, increasing the number of beds to 350; and a State-sponsored ground breaking event was held in 2018, foretelling the opening of the new facility by 2021 replacing the aging Caro facility; and

WHEREAS, Prior to the expense of any funds, State Administrators had vetted the site as acceptable as 70% of current employees travel less than 30 miles to work; the site's central location makes it accessible to state highways for patient transportation to area medical providers and for family visits; that 80% of current patients come from Genesee, Oakland and Macomb Counties, just to the south of Tuscola County and within an average 90 minute drive or less; the 600-acre site is already state-owned and infrastructure is already in place; and, Tuscola County engineers determined the on-site water system can be economically upgraded to improve service to the new hospital; and

WHEREAS, More than \$3 million in taxpayer funds have already been spent in preparation for construction at the Caro site; and

WHEREAS, In March 2019, Construction was halted on the facility and the State contracted with a private consulting firm, at the cost of \$277,000, to re-assess the location of the new state psychiatric facility, potentially delaying the availability of improved psychiatric services including provision of new beds and the replacement of the aging Caro facility by another 2-4 years; and

WHEREAS, The facility is vital for this entire region of Michigan, including the City of Frankenmuth, as the existing facility infuses an estimated \$54 million annually into the regional

economy while directly employing 350 people and indirectly employing another 400 people; and, Relocation of the facility would have devastating negative repercussions to businesses, schools and families living in communities throughout this region of the state;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Frankenmuth Downtown Development Authority_urges Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Department of Health and Human Services Director Robert Gordon, and members of the State Legislature, in response to a critical shortage of inpatient state psychiatric beds, to continue with the renovation of the existing Caro center and construction of a new 200-bed, state psychiatric hospital on the grounds of the current Caro Center located in Tuscola County, as and valued and economic option for quality, accessible services to patients and their families, and to the taxpayers of Michigan; all this, preventing devastating impact to businesses, schools employees and families living in communities throughout this region of the state; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be transmitted to Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Department of Health and Human Services Director Robert Gordon, State Senator Kevin Daley, and State Representative Phil Green and Tuscola County administrators.

Tuscola County Health Department Board of Health Report: July 19, 2019 Ann Hepfer RN, B.S Health Officer

Outcomes for the Month:

1. **Dental Update**: I am still working with Great Lakes Bay Health Care on bringing Dental Services to Tuscola County. I have been working with Dr. Crowley in regards to bringing the Dental Bus to Tuscola County. Right now they are looking to replace two of their Dentist vacancies, so until they have them replaced it would be difficult for them to add Dental locations. The bus would be located in the Health Department Parking lot and provide hygienist care and cleanings; and if there was an issue they would be referred to one of their dental offices.

I am going to develop a quick survey that will be given out starting July 15-August 9 to assess the need for the hygienist services. If the need is greater for a Dentist, then we might need to wait. This will assist GLBHC in their decision making process.

- 2. **Medical Examiner Secretary:** I had a phone conversation with Eric Morris, last week regarding Dr. Bush's contract with the Health Department. Deb Cook needs to provide Eric some additional costs based on an hourly wage verses a salary range and then we should be able to move ahead. This contract would have a termination date of May 30, 2022, and renegotiated at that time.
- 3. Emergency Preparedness Position: The state has been in discussion with the health department in the past several years to consider combining the EPC role for Huron and Tuscola Counties. This will result in less administrative costs to both health departments, more costs are going into the actual program. With Kathy Pokorski's retirement on July 26, this was the best time to make this change. The EPC in Huron County is willing to do both Huron and Tuscola Counties. We will contract with Huron County Health Department for both the clerical support and the EPC. With the additional funds not being spent on the administration of this program, we will be able to move some hours of a communicable disease nurse into the EPC program to support surveillance and school communicable disease reporting.
- 4. Front Lobby Renovations: The Health Department lobby/reception area is outdated. The reception area was never designed to handle all of the technology advances. The clerical workstations are too small to accommodate the larger screens and devices that are required to get the jobs done. The lobby is not conducive to keeping conversations with clerks confidential, we have work around, but it is not ideal. Mike Miller is aware of the need to remodel, and has been providing us with names and numbers of firms to seek advice from. The two companies that have looked at so far both said "you need an architect". We are in the process of seeking architectural advice.



Michigan's Five Most Common Ticks

8

Ticks are significant carriers of pathogens that cause human and animal disease. Listed here is a ranked order of the ticks most likely to bite humans in Michigan,



1. American dog tick (Dermacentor variabilis)

Distribution: Widespread throughout Michigan forests and grassy areas **Key Facts**: These ticks are active from early May-November, and will bite both humans and companion animals.

Diseases: Diseases associated with the American dog tick are rare in Michigan, but may include Rocky Mountain spotted fever and tularemia.



2. Blacklegged tick (Ixodes scapularis)

Distribution: Emerging in Michigan, see map at right **Key Facts**: Found on low forest vegetation, often along human and animal trails.

Diseases: Lyme disease is the most common tick-borne disease in Michigan. Other rare diseases include: anaplasmosis, babesiosis, deer-tick virus, and ehritchiosis.





3. Lone star tick (Amblyomma americanum)

Distribution: Occasionally found in wooded and grassy areas across the state

Key Facts: An aggressive biter of humans and companion animals, adult females have distinctive "Lone Star" mark


Diseases: Ehrlichiosis, rocky mountain spotted fever, tularemia



4. Woodchuck tick (Ixodes cookei)

Distribution: Found most commonly on pets throughout Michigan **Key Facts**: Usually found near dens of skunks and woodchucks, will bite companion animals near animal dens and occasionally humans

Diseases: Powassan encephalitis



5. Brown dog tick (Rhipecephalus sanguineus)

Distribution: Occasionally found in Michigan.

Key Facts: can uniquely survive and breed in indoor environments, has been associated with kennel, shelter, and breeding facilities. Good hygiene practices can prevent indoor infestations.

Diseases: Rocky mountain spotted fever, canine babesiosis, canine ehrlichiosis

Tick Bite and Tick-Borne Disease Prevention

- Use insect repellents containing no more than 30 percent DEET.
- Use repellents that contain permethrin on clothing.
- After spending time outdoors, check your skin and clothes for ticks.
- See your healthcare provider if you have symptoms of fever, rash, body aches or fatigue.

TRIAL COURT FUNDING COMMISSION INTERIM REPORT

July 9, 2019

- WHEREAS, the County Clerks in Michigan have a constitutional stake in the trial court funding question, but were excluded from participation in the Trial Court Funding Commission. The County Clerks have a unique relationship with the courts and a perspective that should be heard when making recommendations for substantial changes.
- **WHEREAS**, the goal of Public Act 65 of 2017 was to create a Trial Court Funding Commission to "review and recommend changes to the trial court funding system in light of *People v. Cunningham*".
- WHEREAS, the vast majority of the Interim Report deals with the consolidation of all local court staff and operations under state control but does not solve the funding problems that *Cunningham* created (simply moving collections of fines and costs and payment of court salaries/benefits to the state does not mitigate the fact that we will still not be funded adequately).
- WHEREAS, centralized control of our court process does not necessarily serve the best interest of the public. The County Clerks believe that local judges and citizens are better served by local custodial control. It has been proven to be a more responsive method of serving their needs.
- WHEREAS, research of other state-funded court systems has shown that state funding creates a culture of complacency that tolerates delay. Accountability is removed from the local level and placed in the hands of bureaucrats in state government who are less connected to the people.
- WHEREAS, we are concerned that transferring funding to state control would tether the judicial branch to the short term whims of the legislative and executive branches even more than they exist already. In the event of a lack of state funding (government shutdown) this process would also force the shutdown of the court system, resulting in constitutional violation of due process.
- WHEREAS, it is critical to note that the finding of 46th Circuit Trial Court v. County of Crawford, 2006:143 states directly: "In order for the judicial branch to carry out its constitutional responsibilities as envisioned by the Constitution of 1963, art3, SS 2, the judiciary cannot be totally beholden to legislative determinations regarding its budgets."
- WHEREAS, this Interim Report recommends altering the Michigan Constitution to provide that circuit court clerks are employed by the court and under the supervision of state government rather than the County Clerk.

- WHEREAS, County Clerks serve a critical role in the judicial system. They are constitutionally mandated to ensure the integrity of the records and protecting the best interests of our citizens. Removing County Clerks from the picture would serve as substantial disruption to the purpose that we serve.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Hillsdale County Board of Commissioners are opposed to the Trial Court Funding Commission Interim Report dated April 8, 2019. We believe that it is imperative to maintain local control and accountability because that is how our constituents are best served. We strongly oppose this Interim Report and possible pending legislation and encourage the other 82 Michigan counties to join us.
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Senator Mike Shirkey, Representative Eric Leutheuser, the Michigan Association of Counties and the other 82 Michigan Counties.

FUNDING THE GREAT LAKES RESTORATION INITIATIVE

WHEREAS, The Great Lakes are a critical resource for our nation, supporting the economy and a way of life in Michigan and the other seven states within the Great Lakes region. The Great Lakes hold 20 percent of the world's surface freshwater and 90 percent of the United States' surface freshwater. This globally significant freshwater resource provides drinking water for more than 30 million people and directly supports 1.5 million jobs, generating \$62 billion in wages: and

WHEREAS, The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) provides essential funding to restore and protect the Great Lakes. This funding has supported long overdue efforts to clean up toxic pollution, reduce runoff from cities, industries, and farms, combat invasive species, and restore fish and wildlife habitat. Since 2010, the federal government has partnered with public and private entities and invested more than \$2 billion in over 2,900 projects throughout the region. Over its first six years, the GLRI has provided more than \$425 million for more than 500 projects in Michigan alone. The Brookings Institution has estimated that every dollar invested in the Great Lakes produces two dollars in long-term economic benefits, and

WHEREAS, GLRI projects are making a significant difference. They have restored more than 150,000 acres of fish and wildlife habitat; opened up fish access to more than 3,400 miles of rivers; helped implement conservation programs on more than 1 million acres of farmland; and accelerated the cleanup of toxic hotspots. In Michigan, GLRI funding has been instrumental in removing invasive Phragmites along the shores of Green Bay, remediation and habitat restoration in the Menominee River, revitalizing Lake Michigan sturgeon populations, habitat restoration at Sea Gull Bar, and building fish passages around the lower dams of the Menominee River; and

WHEREAS, While a significant investment, past GLRI funding represents only a small portion of the amount needed to restore and protect the Great Lakes Toxic algae blooms, beach closings, fish consumption advisories, and the presence of contaminated sediments continue to limit the recreational and commercial use of the Great Lakes; and

WHEREAS, Any cuts to GLRI funding would jeopardize the momentum from over a decade of unprecedented regional cooperation. Draft federal budgets have proposed a 97 percent reduction in GLRI funding. These drastic cuts would be a short-sighted, short-term cost-saving measure with long-term adverse implications. Restoration efforts will only become more expensive and more difficult if they are not addressed now and in the coming years.

RESOLUTION 2019-15

MEDICARE PRESCRIPTION DRUG BILL OF 2003

WHEREAS, health care costs continue to rise for all Americans, and for most Americans these increases can be financially devastating and impact the health of the individual, and

WHEREAS, Medicare is the focus of many lawmakers who portray it as an "entitlement" program that costs the US Treasury too much money. Technically, "entitlement" may be the proper term; however, as used, it implies a negative connotation; and

WHEREAS, Medicare is an essential medical plan that millions of seniors and disabled individuals depend upon to maintain their health care and manage often costly conditions. Medicare is not a gift, as the term 'entitlement' suggests. Many of the beneficiaries have worked their entire adult life and paid into the system in order to receive this crucial medical plan after retirement; and

WHEREAS, due to spiraling costs largely associated with the price of prescription medications, our elected officials find themselves passing on increased costs to those who can least afford that increase, namely senior citizens and disabled individuals who are on Medicare's Part D drug program; and

WHEREAS, when Congress enacted the Medicare Prescription Drug bill, they enacted a law that does allow Medicare to negotiate with pharmaceutical companies for drug prices the way Medicaid and the Veterans Administration does; and

WHEREAS, one economist, Dean Baker, estimates that Medicare could have saved approximately \$332 billion dollars between 2006 and 2013 (approximately \$50 billion per year) had the Department of Health and Human Services been permitted to negotiate prices of drugs with the drug companies, as federal agencies do in other programs; and

WHEREAS, rising prescription drug costs have been the primary reason for the increase in health benefit costs; and

WHEREAS, the increasing cost of prescription drugs is a systemic problem that significantly affects the people of our state and our nation. It deserves non-partisan effort to correct; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Menominee County Board of Commissioners goes on record urging our legislators to commence the process of revising the Medicare Prescription Drug Bill of 2003 to allow negotiating lower drug prices and the importation of identical, less costly, drugs from Canada and elsewhere; and

NOW BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to our area Federal and State Legislators, the National Association of Counties, Michigan Association of Counties, and the 82 Michigan counties.

TRIAL COURT FUNDING COMMISSION INTERIM REPORT

WHEREAS, the County Clerks in Michigan have a constitutional stake in the trial court funding question, but were excluded from participation in the Trial Court Funding Commission. The County Clerks have a unique relationship with the courts and a perspective that should be heard when making recommendations for substantial changes.

WHEREAS, the goal of Public Act 65 of 2017 was to create a Trial Court Funding Commission to "review and recommend changes to the trial court funding system in light of *People v. Cunningham*".

WHEREAS, the vast majority of the Interim Report deals with the consolidation of all local court staff and operations under state control but does not solve the funding problems that *Cumningham* created (simply moving collections of fines and costs and payment of court salaries/benefits to the state does not mitigate the fact that we will still not be funded adequately).

WHEREAS, centralized control of our court process does not necessarily serve the best interest of the public. The County Clerks believe that local judges and citizens are better served by local custodial control. It has been proven to be a more responsive method of serving their needs.

WHEREAS, research of other state-funded court systems has shown that state funding creates a culture of complacency that tolerates delay. Accountability is removed from the local level and placed in the hands of bureaucrats in state government who are less connected to the people.

WHEREAS, we are concerned that transferring funding to state control would tether the judicial branch to the short term whims of the legislative and executive branches even more than they exist already. In the event of a lack of state funding (government shutdown) this process would also force the shutdown of the court system, resulting in constitutional violation of due process.

WHEREAS, it is critical to note that the finding of 46th Circuit Trial Court v. County of Crawford, 2006:143 states directly: "In order for the judicial branch to carry out its constitutional responsibilities as envisioned by the Constitution of 1963, art3, SS 2, the

Judiciary cannot be totally beholden to legislative determinations regarding its budgets."

WHEREAS, this Interim Report recommends altering the Michigan Constitution to provide that circuit court clerks are employed by the court and under the supervision of state government rather than the County Clerk.

WHEREAS, County Clerks serve a critical role in the judicial system. They are constitutionally mandated to ensure the integrity of the records and protecting the best interests of our citizens. Removing County Clerks from the picture would serve as substantial disruption to the purpose that we serve.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Marquette County Board of Commissioners are opposed to the Trial Court Funding Commission Interim Report dated April 8, 2019. We believe that it is imperative to maintain local control and accountability because that is how our constituents are best served. We strongly oppose this Interim Report and possible pending legislation and encourage the other 82 Michigan counties to join us.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Senator Ed McBroom, Representative Sara Cambensy, the Michigan Association of Counties and the other 82 Michigan Counties.
