Re: Ticks in Tuscola County. Respectfully, request to fill the current vacant position of Seasonal Biology Technician. Respectfully, request to fill Seasonal Assistant Foreman position.

- 1. Ticks in Tuscola County.
  - A brief talk of presence and awareness.
- 2. Request to fill current vacant position of Seasonal Biology Technician at Step 2 (\$16.73 per hour) with long time employee, Dennis Haley. Mr. Haley would be vacating the Assistant foreman position. This would be a budget neutral request since the pay scales are the same for both positions.
  - The Seasonal Biology Technician has remained vacant due to a shortage in personnel. With the hiring of two new technicians for the 2023 season, we now have the opportunity to provide our Biologist with much needed assistance.
  - The biology lab is a key component in identifying and protecting our resident from mosquito borne diseases. The lab also determines which areas of the county are experiencing higher counts of mosquito activity through trapping results. This determines where treatment efforts need to be focused.
  - The Seasonal Biology Technician position also provides a vital back-up to our Biologist in the event of her absence.

3. Request to fill Seasonal Assistant Foreman position with long time employee, Rodney Spiers, at Step 1 of the pay scale (\$16.33 per hour). This would create an approximate increase to the 2023 Mosquito Abatement part-time budget of approximately \$2000 with FICA and work comp included.

- Instruction of Boating Safety Courses;
- Inspection of Boat Liveries;
- Attendance at Authorized Marine Safety Training (attendance at the Department's Annual Administrators' Workshop and the Michigan Sheriffs' Association's New Marine Officers Training are pre-authorized).

#### Operating Expenses for the Scope Items Listed Above, including:

- Purchase of fuel, oil, and parts for patrol vehicles, watercraft, and trailers:
- Travel expenses;
- Uniforms, personal flotation devices, boat shoes, etc.;
- · Leasing of vehicles, dockage, storage, eligible office space;
- · Boat repair, replacement and/or servicing of boat outfitting equipment.
- 2. Salary and Wages are reimbursable to the GRANTEE at the employees' hourly rate. Overtime is only eligible if the employee worked in excess of 80 hours for full time employees and 40 hours for part time employees in a pay period on Marine Safety duties.
- 3. Operating Expenses must be done within the grant period and goods and services must be delivered and/or work performed. Pre-paying for goods and services within the grant period and then receiving them at a later date or performing the work after the expiration of the grant agreement is not allowable.
- 4. The percentage of the GRANTEE'S total budget devoted to operating expenses shall not exceed Forty percent (40%), unless prior approval has been obtained from the DEPARTMENT.
- 5. Part 801 Marine Safety, of the Michigan Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act (1994 PA 451, as amended), authorizes the distribution of revenues to counties from the Marine Safety Fund, for the purpose of supporting county Marine Safety programs. State funding, in the amount shown below is provided to the GRANTEE by the DEPARMENT for the purpose of supporting the GRANTEE'S Marine Safety program.
  - The DEPARTMENT agrees to reimburse the GRANTEE a sum of money equal to 75% of total eligible costs toward completing the scope of work listed above, but not to exceed \$13,900.00 dollars.

A local match of at least 25% of total eligible costs is required for this reimbursement.

The Agreement period for state funding is January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023.

- This Agreement shall be administered on behalf of the DEPARTMENT through the Finance and Operations Division. All

- 7. Reimbursement will be made only upon DEPARTMENT review and approval of a complete reimbursement request submitted by the GRANTEE through the MiGrants website.
- 8. The GRANTEE may not assign or transfer any interest in this Agreement to any other agency, group or individual.
- The GRANTEE shall display valid and proper state of Michigan registration on all vessels and comply with the state of Michigan life jacket regulations.
- 10. This Agreement may be canceled by the DEPARTMENT, upon 30 days written notice, due to Executive Order, budgetary reduction, other lack of funding, upon request by the GRANTEE, or upon mutual Agreement by the DEPARTMENT and GRANTEE. The DEPARTMENT may honor requests for just and equitable compensation to the GRANTEE for all satisfactory and eligible work completed under this Agreement up until 30 days after written notice, upon which time all outstanding reports and documents are due to the DEPARTMENT and the DEPARTMENT will no longer be liable to pay the GRANTEE for any further charges to the grant.
- 11. The GRANTEE agrees not to discriminate against an employee or applicant for employment with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, or a matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of

because of religion, race, color, national origin, age, sex, sexual orientation, height, weight, marital status, partisan considerations, or a disability or genetic information that is unrelated to the person's ability to perform the duties of a particular job or position. The GRANTEE further agrees that any subcontract shall contain non-discrimination provisions which are not less stringent than this provision and binding upon any and all subcontractors. A breach of this covenant shall be regarded as a material breach of this Agreement.

12. The GRANTEE agrees to follow the DEPARTMENT procedure policy:

- a. The GRANTEE will openly advertise and seek written bids for contracts for purchase or services with a value equal to or greater than \$50,000.00 and accept the lowest qualified bid.
- b. The GRANTEE will solicit three (3) written quotes for contracts with purchases or services between \$5,000.00 and \$50,000.00.
- 13. The Agreement may be executed separately by the parties. This Agreement is not effective until:
  - a. The GRANTEE has signed it and returned it, and
  - b. The DEPARTMENT has signed it.
- 14. The award is not for Research and Development.

# Revenue sharing boost, other county priorities clear another budget hurdle

This week, the full House and Senate approved their fiscal 2024 budgets along party-line votes. Current plans include significant state investments for counties in a variety of areas. There are some key differences in House and Senate versions, however, which must now be resolved in joint conference committees. # Revenue sharing

#### House Bill 4292:

- 17 percent hike in revenue sharing, divided into several segments:
  - o 5 percentage points would be ongoing and for general use
  - 5 percentage points would be a one-time appropriation for general use
  - o 2 percentage points would be ongoing and restricted to public safety uses
  - 5 percentage points would be a one-time appropriation restricted to public safety uses

These changes would place FY24 revenue sharing at more than \$285 million.

### Senate Bill 189:

- Includes the same ongoing and one-time boosts for general use as HB 4292
- · Does not include additional funding for public safety

- Ends the County Incentive Program and its requirements for the annual submission of verification of the
  posting of budgets online and the publication of citizens guides
- Allows access to any unallocated funds from a \$750 million appropriation for municipal pension assistance for use as grants for local governments with OPEB obligations funded at 7 percent or less
- Adds a new program within the Department of Attorney General to assist communities with high crime, allocating \$10 million and 45 full-time positions

The Senate plan would place FY24 revenue sharing at \$269 million.

## Health and human services

### House Bill 4310:

- · Direct care wage increase
  - \$2.35/hour and \$140 million for an additional \$1/hour increase on a one-time basis
- Child Care Fund (community-based state reimbursement)
  - \$31.5 million to implement a recommendation from the Michigan Task Force on Juvenile Justice Reform
  - Statutorily increases the state Child Care Fund Reimbursement rate from 50 percent to 75 percent for community-based juvenile justice services
- Foster Family Maintenance Payment Increase
  - \$12 million to fund a 5 percent increase to daily payments
- Behavioral Health Recruiting and Retention (one-time)
  - \$5 million for recruitment and retention programs for behavioral health professionals (using federal coronavirus state fiscal recovery funds)
- Medicaid Mental Health Local Match
  - \$5 million to replace a like amount of local funding used for Medicaid mental health supports and services (This amount reflects the fourth year of phasing out to the local match portion over a fiveyear period.)
- Essential Local Public Health Services Increase
  - \$14 million to support an estimated 50 percent of the costs of essential local public health services
- · Court-operated facility construction
  - \$25 million to construct a 32-bed court operated facility in northern Michigan for youth involved in the court system

## Senate Bill 190:

- Direct care worker wage increases
  - 65 cents per hour increase in direct care worker wages
  - \$3 per hour increase to non-direct care staff at long-term care facilities
- · Child Care Fund reimbursement rates
  - \$31.5 million for increase to 75 percent in Child Care Fund for community-based services
- Support for state share of Essential Local Public Health Services
  - \$30 million for local health departments, ongoing support for essential local public health services

# Public safety

#### House Bill 4280:

• Michigan Indigent Defense Commission Grants



 \$57.2 million for Standard 8 (Standard 8 pertains to economic disincentives and incentives, including rates of payment for salaried public defenders, compensation and expenses for assigned counsel, contracting for indigent defense services, conflict counsel, reimbursements and payments.)

### Senate Bill 195:

- Michigan Indigent Defense Commission Grants
  - \$30 million for Standard 8

#### Transportation

#### House Bill 4309:

- \$6.81 billion in total funding
- Adds \$400 million for local road preservation, which would be distributed to local road agencies based on population
  - This is in addition to Public Act 51 dollars
- \$100 placeholder for bridge bundling program
- \$75 million in local bus operating investments
- \$33 million for rail grade separation

## Senate Bill 178:

- \$6.83 billion in total funding
- \$150 million for bridge bundling program
- \$100 million for Intermodal Capital Investment Grant Program
- \$150 million for local road funding projects for the largest six counties in Michigan, distributed by population
  - This is in addition to Public Act 51 dollars
- \$100 million for critical infrastructure projects
- \$100 million for high-speed rail
- \$50 million for a rail grade separation project in Trenton



#### House Bill 4249:

- \$1.45 billion in total spending (\$395.5 million is General Fund)
- \$110 million in General Fund for replacing lead service lines and providing technical assistance to communities, supplemented by \$100 million in one-time federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund dollars
- \$40 million for grants to communities to establish wind, solar and energy storage facilities
- \$20 million for dam safety and risk reduction

# MAC-opposed mining regulation bill still in committee

A House committee on Tuesday deferred action on legislation that attacks local control after local governments and residents delivered thoughtful testimony to keep aggregate zoning authority out of the hands of the state.

MAC appreciates the support of members who have used our <u>digital advocacy tool</u> in recent days to send messages of opposition to <u>House Bills 4526-28</u>.

The House Regulatory Reform Committee held a two-hour session Tuesday on the bills, which aim to eliminate local

control of sand and gravel mining operations and grant regulating authority to the Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE).



Aggregate and construction industries argued in favor of the bills, based largely on how much money could be saved by placing the permitting power in the hands of the state and the inconvenience of having to deal with townships and public input.

EGLE has not taken a position, but department officials noted the department currently oversees just eight active mining permits and are uncertain how many more would fall under their purview should this legislation pass. The speakers were also unclear on the number of full-time employees they would need to run the program.

The Michigan Townships Association (MTA) and Michigan Municipal League (MML) spoke strongly in opposition to the legislation. In its testimony, MTA disproved several claims made by proponents, including one that 37 of its members had delayed, denied or disrupted the permitting process. In reality, MTA noted, these townships had simply hired attorneys to help review the proposals.

Though MAC did not testify, the association remains opposed to the legislation, as it would set a dangerous precedent on preemption of local control in other policy areas.

While the committee took no action on the bills this week, it will resume its review on May 16. MAC urges members to use our digital advocacy tool to send a message of opposition to their members of the Michigan House without delay.

# Local control under multiple attacks under Capitol dome

In the <u>newest episode of MAC's Podcast 83</u>, host Stephan Currie and the MAC Governmental Affairs Team of Deena Bosworth, Madeline Fata and Samantha Gibson catch up on legislative activity, particularly the following:

- Attack on local control, part I (mining): House Bills 4526-28 would gut the principle of local control in a bid to make it easier to site gravel and sand pits around Michigan.
- Attack on local control, part II (labor): House Bill 4438 would extend binding arbitration to county correctional officers, thereby transferring decisions on county staffing and budget matters to unaccountable third parties.

MAC is asking members to use <u>our digital advocacy tool</u> to send messages of opposition to both legislative attacks as soon as possible.



However, those bills, and potentially every other legislative initiative, could be halted in a matter of weeks due to political gamesmanship in Lansing and the action of "sine die."

As Bosworth explained, the narrow Democratic majorities in the House and Senate lack the votes on their own to give the fiscal year 2024 budget immediate effect to ensure the fiscal plan starts with the beginning of the state's budget year on Oct. 1. The talk in Lansing is Senate Republicans will refuse to allow immediate effect, thereby forcing the effective date of state spending bills 90 days beyond Oct. 1, a fiscal crisis.



# Federal mandate could worsen medical care facility staffing crisis

An expected federal staffing mandate for nursing facilities could hurt medical care facilities (MCFs) that already are dealing with staffing shortages.

According to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, federal law requires Medicare and Medicaid-certified nursing homes to provide 24-hour licensed services, with a registered professional nurse used at least eight hours per day, seven days a week.

There is potential for the federal government to implement increased staffing requirements. Penalties for not meeting likely mandated staffing ratios will be detrimental to facilities that are already struggling to recruit qualified staff.



Michigan, though, already is facing a loss of about 10,000 nursing facility employees, or 17 percent of Michigan's long-term care workforce, says the Health Care Association of Michigan (HCAM).

MAC and the <u>Michigan Counties Medical Care Facilities Council</u>, which represents the county MCFs, will continue to watch for federal mandates pertaining to increased staffing ratios and any potential penalties for not being able to meet such standards.

# Save taxes and trees by enrolling in MDARD's Qualified Forest Program Page 41 of 56

The Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development's <u>Qualified Forest Program (QFP)</u> is now accepting applications for the 2024 tax year with applications being due no later 11:59 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 1, 2023.

"MDARD's Qualified Forest Program is designed to encourage Michigan's landowners to actively manage their privately owned forests for commercial harvest, wildlife habitat enhancement, and improvement of other forest resources," said Jim Johnson, Director of MDARD's Environmental



Stewardship Division "The program provides two potential tax benefits for enrolled landowners in exchange for managing their forests in a sustainable fashion."

The two possible benefits which helps save landowners on property taxes are:

- School Tax Affidavit —Authorizes an exemption from the local school operation millage up to 18 mills of school operating taxes a year. The exemption only applies to land value.
- Taxable Value Affidavit—Keeps the previous owner's property taxable value from uncapping on enrolled land after a transfer of ownership.

## Requirements for the program:

- Parcels must be 20 acres or larger to qualify
- · A forest management plan must be written by a qualified forester
- · Buildings and structures are allowed, but are not eligible for exemption
- Enrolled landowners must pay an annual fee; public access is not required

For parcels less than 40 acres, no less than 80 percent of that parcel must be stocked with productive forest. For parcels of 40 acres or more, at least 50 percent must be stocked with productive forest.

To apply, landowners are required to submit a QFP Application form, QFP Stand Summary and Harvest Schedule, copy of the most recent deed and/or land contract, copy of a tax bill(s), \$50 application fee, and forest management plan.


# Despite two-year trend of improvement, most Michigan local officials continue to say the state is on the wrong track

Statewide, 59% of Michigan's local government officials say the state is off on the wrong track in 2023 (see *Figure 1*). This is an improvement from 62% in 2022 and from the series high of 67% in 2021, but local leaders' views still have not recovered to pre-COVID levels. Meanwhile, 30% believe the state is generally going in the right direction, a slight improvement from 28% last year and from the series low of 23% in 2021. Overall, 11% are unsure about the direction the state is headed.

Not surprisingly, the MPPS has found these assessments are linked to local leaders' partisan identification and whichever party controls the Governor's office. In other words, Republican local leaders express more support for the state's direction when a Republican is governor and less when a Democrat is in office, and vice versa in the case of Democratic local leaders' assessments (as seen in *Figure 2*). Meanwhile, the statewide percentages in *Figure 1* reflect the makeup of the state's local governments, which include 1,240 townships—most of which are rural, small in terms of population, and led by Republicans—compared with 533 cities and villages which are more often led by Democrats, and 83 counties. Indeed, in 2023, 60% of the MPPS respondents self-identify as Republicans, while 17% say they are Independents, and 23% identify as Democrats.

Percentage of local officials who say Michigan is headed in the 'right direction' or is off on the 'wrong track,' 2011-2023




# Most Republicans and Independents remain pessimistic about the state's direction, while Democrats' optimism grows

The MPPS has tracked the connection between local officials' partisanship and their views of the state's direction since 2011, and the 2023 survey continues to reveal stark differences in how the partisan groups feel about the state's direction.

With the governor's office currently held by Democrat Gretchen Whitmer, only 13% of Republican local officials say the state is going in the right direction, essentially equivalent to the 12% who said the same last year (see *Figure 2*), and from 10% in 2021. Similarly, optimism about the state's direction among local officials who are self-identified Independents (32%) remained unchanged this year, though it is up from 24% in 2021. By comparison, the percentage of self-identified Democrats who think Michigan is headed in the right direction jumped significantly this year to 85%, from 72% in 2022 and 63% in 2021.

# Local leaders' assessments of Governor Whitmer's performance closely mirror their views on direction of the state as "poor" ratings decline

The MPPS also asks local officials to evaluate the job performance of the sitting governor, starting in 2009 with Governor Jennifer Granholm, through Governor Rick Snyder's two terms, and now into current Governor Gretchen Whitmer's second term.

In 2023, less than a third (30%) of local leaders statewide rate Governor Whitmer's performance as "excellent" or "good," unchanged from 30% last year, and less than the 34% who say the state is headed in the right direction (see *Figure 3*). Meanwhile, 27% rate the Governor's job performance as "fair," up slightly from 23% a year ago. Over a third (38%) rate her performance today as "poor," a decrease from 44% last year.

As with assessments of the state's direction, these ratings on job performance are also strongly associated with partisanship. As shown in *Figure 4*, 86% of Democratic local leaders currently give Governor Whitmer positive ratings, up from an already high 81% in 2022. Among Independents, her positive ratings (37%) are essentially unchanged from last year.

Meanwhile, just 11% of Republican local leaders rate Governor Whitmer's performance as good or excellent in 2022, also basically unchanged from last year. Although not shown in the figure, this year 53% of Republican local officials give Governor Whitmer's performance a poor rating, a significant drop from the 62% who said the same last year.

Local officials' evaluations of Governor Whitmer's performance compared with previous Governors' performances, 2009-2023




# Assessments of the Michigan Legislature shift markedly in partisan direction

Last year, local leaders' assessments of the Michigan Legislature's performance shifted toward the positive. However, in 2023, with the change in partisan control of both the Michigan House and Senate from Republicans to Democrats, sentiments have once more turned downward statewide. Relatively few local leaders overall believe the Michigan Legislature is doing an outright excellent or good job (16%), and ratings of fair dropped from 51% in 2022 to 42% in 2023 (see *Figure 5*). At the same time, the percent who view its performance as poor jumped from 27% last year to 35% today.

By contrast with ongoing partisan-affiliated evaluations of the state's direction and of Governor Whitmer's performance, earlier partisan differences in evaluations of the Legislature's performance had nearly disappeared over the last few years. However, with the change of partisan legislative control after the November 2022 elections, local partisan sentiments have triggered a huge shift in the views of the Legislature's work this year. Although the views of Independents are unchanged, with 13% saying the Legislature is doing an excellent or good job, Republican leaders' positive ratings have dropped from 19% last year to 7% this year, while Democrats' have more than doubled from 20% to 48% (see Figure 6). It is worthwhile noting that the MPPS survey ran from early February to early April this year, corresponding with just the earliest days of the new legislative session under Democratic control.

Figure 5 Local officials' evaluations of Michigan Legislature's performance, 2009-2023




# **Survey Background and Methodology**

The Michigan Public Policy Survey (MPPS) is an ongoing census survey of all 1,856 general purpose local governments in Michigan conducted since 2009 by the Center for Local, State, and Urban Policy (CLOSUP) at the University of Michigan's Gerald R Ford School of Public Policy. The program is a partnership with Michigan's local government associations. The Spring 2023 wave was conducted February 6 - April 17, 2023. Respondents include county administrators, board chairs, and clerks; city mayors, managers, and clerks: village presidents, managers, and clerks: and township supervisors, managers, and clerks from 1,307 jurisdictions across the state, resulting in a 70% response rate by unit. # MICHIGAN HOUSE BILLS 4526-4528 Opposition to Legislation Preempting Local Control

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Lenawee County Board of Commissioners strongly urges its State House of Representatives to oppose House Bills 4526, 4527, and 4528 which would silence local voices on aggregate operations in our community.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Lenawee County Board of Commissioners supports the Michigan Townships Association (MTA), Michigan Municipal League (MML), and Michigan Association of Counties (MAC) in their joint statement in this preemption of local control.
