



2005 Grants

Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority (MMRMA), who is the county's liability insurance carrier was very helpful in 2005 in off setting costs for training and equipment by providing Risk Avoidance Programs (RAP) grant monies to the Sheriff's Office where the liability is so high.

The first grant allowed us to install a digital recording system and camera system to provide security inside and outside of the jail. This has really been helpful in eliminating fights and disputes in the cells among inmates. The camera and recording system have also helped in eliminating allegations against a Corrections Officer in performance of their duties. The original cost to install was \$25,975.00. MMRMA awarded \$5,000.00.

The 2nd grant included the purchase of 5 TASERS to be used by the Corrections Division and Road Patrol. The first 2 TASERS and equipment were purchased for \$1,969.00. MMRMA award \$250.00 for each TASER.

With the 3rd grant we purchased 2 in-car digital cameras for our patrol units along with 1 digital in-car camera for the Millington Twp patrol unit with whom we contract for police services. Millington Twp purchased 1 for \$6,750.00, and we purchased 2 for our new patrol units for a total \$13,500.00, MMRMA awarded \$7,500.00.

MMRMA provided training and partial payment of costs for the following:

- 1. Sgt. Robert Baxter, Deputies Steve Anderson, Dale Tompkins, and Steve Roland attended "Tactical Encounters for Patrol Officers".
- 2. Sgt. Robert Baxter attended training "Firearms Proficiency and Simulation Workshop".
- 3. Cpl. David Schwartz attended "Michigan Jail Administrator's Workshop".
- 4. Det/Sgt. Glen Skrent attended "Mission Team Investigations Workshop" (internal investigations).
- 5. Sheriff Thomas Kern attended "Sheriff's and Police Chiefs Command Staff".

These are some of the areas that Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority has provided grant monies and training to us during these times of high liability and reduced budgets.

Tuscola County Community Foundation Grants

The Tuscola County Community Foundation is a nonprofit corporation dedicated to improving the quality of life in Tuscola County. TCCF is a unique institution. It is a flexible collection of endowment funds contributed by people from all walks of life who want to give something to their community. The principal of their gifts, both large and small, will remain intact forever with only the income used for grants to tackle today's needs and prepare for tomorrow's challenges.

In 2005 we applied for two different grants from the Community Foundation.

The first grant was for obtaining Laser Measuring Technology and mapping software to reconstruct serious and/or fatal traffic crashes by our Accident Reconstructionist Deputies Michael Mattlin and Ryan Pierce. The instruments and software allows the deputies to quickly and accurately measure a crash scene in a much shorter period of time. The deputies download the measurements into a computer at the office, and then create an accurate map of the scene and the events leading up to the impact of the vehicles. The technology allows a complete picture to be used in courtroom testimony.

We obtained a \$9,702.00 grant to pay for all of the equipment. The Sheriff's 302 training funds paid \$2,700.00 to train Deputies Michael Mattlin and Ryan Pierce to use the equipment and mapping software in June of 2005.

We applied for a 2nd grant to replace all the bulletproof vests of the road patrol. Our insurance carrier MMRMA recommends they be replaced every 5 years. Tests have proven the Kevlar and other substances will deteriorate enough that they may fail if struck by a bullet.

We obtained \$6,950.00 from the community foundation and \$6,950.00 from the Department of Justice's Bullet Proof Vest program.

The 2005 boating season started with Boater Safety in the Tuscola County Schools. Deputy James Kern continued the teaching responsibilities this year and successfully completed the year with 913 students participating and 793 certified in the public and private schools. Please contact us if you are interested in attending Safe Boating classes. We are always striving to increase the number of schools visited and the students certified in this program offered to all schools in the county.

The new laws regarding Personal Watercraft (PWC) set requirements for a boating certificate before operating a PWC. Following are two important requirements regarding certification:

- A person 12 years of age, but less than 16 years of age, before January 1, 1999 may use a PWC if they obtained a boating safety certificate before January 1, 1999.
- A person who was born after December 31, 1978 must obtain a boating safety certificate before they can operate a PWC.

A boating Safety Certificate is valid for the life of the person who earned the certificate, unless the certificate is revoked because of certain circumstances. Our education program in the schools allows the students to obtain the Boater Safety Certificate required by law to operate these PWCs.

JD Motorsports in Caro donated two personal water craft for patrol on both Saginaw Bay and the county's inland lakes. Our continued thanks go to JD Motorsports and their manufacturers, Kawasaki Motors Corp. USA, for participating in our efforts to make Tuscola County a safe place to enjoy boating.

Tuscola County once again proves to be a safe place for boating and is happy to report there were no accidents this year. With close to 75 square miles of Saginaw Bay, 5 inland lakes and many miles of Cass River shore line, county residents and visitors continue to increase the use of the county water ways each year. In the year 2006, education, regulation and enforcement, again will be the key goal for the Marine Division along with maintaining the safe waters of Tuscola County for all to enjoy.

Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management 2005

The Office of Emergency Management continues its directive of **mitigation**, **preparedness**, **response**, **and recovery**.

L.E.P.C. - (Local Emergency Planning Committee)

The Tuscola County Local Emergency Planning Committee (**LEPC**) continues to meet once a month. The LEPC continues to work with the farm community with farm site planning and the LEAD (grain bin rescue) Local Emergency Assistance Detachment. Tuscola County LEPC Animals In Disaster sub-committee is working on a response plan for domestic and farm animals in case of an emergency or disaster. The LEPC continues to work with private industry to complete site planning for all SARA Title III sites that handle or store extremely hazardous materials within Tuscola County. We are now 85% complete and have started the task of reviewing the older plans and updating them on a continual basis.

Civil Defense Network and Warning System

We had 12 Civil Defense Network Tests during 2005, that tested our response capability in case of an emergency.

The Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management received numerous weather related events including snow advisories, Frost Freeze warnings, Winter Storm Warnings, blizzard warning, High Wind Warnings, Flood Watches and Warnings, Severe Thunderstorm Watches and Warnings, and Tornado Watches and Warnings.

Training

I continued my training in Emergency Management and accumulated about 100 hours of documented training in a varietty of areas including Terrorism, Weapons of Mass Destruction and *Homeland Security*. I continue to work on and update the Emergency Action Guidelines (EAG), Hazard Analysis, Standards, call up and contact lists, and the resource manual. In 2005 we tested our EOC communications during the Region III Bio Terrorism exercise that included the Tuscola County Health Department, hospitals, and EMS personnel. The Homeland Security iniative has identified it is vital that we train together in order to understand our roles and responsibilities and learn what the expected actions of the other first responders and public officials are in an emergency, disaster or terrorism incident.

The Office of Homeland Security has directed that all disciplines train to the same standards by using NIMS- National Incident Management System in order to become eligible for any Federal Grant Money. This has put a huge burden on rural responders because 80% of them are volunteers. The NIMS requirement for 2005 mandates that all Command and Supervisors for first responders must complete two home study courses for compliancy.

The office of Emergency Management assisted in training supervisors and command staff for first responders in NIMS – plus many Fire and Law Enforcement agencies trained their non command personnel also, which has put us ahead of Federal requirements. Thank You to those who continue to go above and beyond.

Activities of Emergency Management

I continue my involvement with Tuscola County *Fire Chiefs Association, Firefighters Association Tuscola County Police Chiefs, RACES*/ARES(*Radio, Amateur Civil Emergency* Services/Amatuer Radio Emergency Service), TAC (*Technical Advisory Committee*), *LEPC* (Local Emergency Planning Committee), LEPC Animals in Disaster, and *LEAD* (Local Emergency Assistance Detachment). I am also a Board Member of the *Saginaw Valley Medical Control*, I am a member of the Tuscola County Technical Center Advisory Committee for Law Enforcement. I continue to Co-Chair the All Hazards Planning Team to deal with all hazards planning team. I continue as a member of the Region 3 Bio/Terrorism Planning Committee. I am a member of the Tuscola County Human Rescources Coordinating Council. I serve as the immediate past president of the 3rd District Emergency Managers Association, and the 3rd District Volunteer Awards Committee.

The Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management conducted three orientations, three exercise drills, and participated in the Region III bio-terroism full scale disaster exercise in August.

Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management along with local public officials, first responders and response agencies are working with a consultant to develop a comprehensive County Mitigation Plan. This is requirement for any future Federal mitigation funding.

Incidents for 2005

The Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management responded to, or was notified of. various incidents including *our schools*, chemcial, oil, gas, leaks or spills, also traffic accidents that invovled hazardous materials and numerous weather related events for 2005.

Homeland Security for 2005

Homeland Security funding has been directed to urban area iniatives leaving rural America to do with less. We received about \$400,000.00 in 2004 and for 2005 we will be eligible for just over \$18,000.00. It should be noted that we are not alone because almost every county north of Bay City, Midland area received the same Homeland Security funding for 2005. The mandate is to have a Regional response which puts the burden back on the local responders to become vigilant in taking care of themselves. It begins with personal preparedness and expands to family, neighbors, neighborhoods, communities and eventually counties.

Homeland Security has prompted everyone to begin dealing with response planning for biological, chemical, and weapons of mass destruction incidents at the local level. These incidents **demand** the **need** for all Federal, State or Local public officials (including schools), agencies, departments and all first responders agencies to share information, training, and their expertise, because no agency, department or jurisdiction can effectively do it alone. It is ironic that at a time of economic shortfalls it has become one of the most critical times when we need to pull together. I feel more than ever we need to become "ONE TEAM, ONE GOAL.", in order to handle the **all hazards** approach to any emergency or disaster.

2005 Emergency Management Income Report

In 2004/5 the Department of Justice and Homeland Security Equipment Grant's were applied for through the Office of Emergency Management. Tuscola County received payment for several grants activities and equipment that we had expended money on to respond to a Terrorist, or Weapons of Mass Destruction incidents.

The Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management completed the second Federal Risk and Threat Assessment on November 1st2003 and therefore became eligible to receive Department of Justice /Homeland Security Federal Funding for 2004/5. First Responder Command and Supervisors were required to complete classes on NIMS National Incident Management System to become eligible for Federal Grant Money.

An All Hazards Planning Team help prioritize the equipment and needs of the 11 responding disciplines to enhance our local response to a Terrorist or WMD event.



The Education Program at the jail is a service provided by Caro Community Schools. It has been in existence since the mid-1970s. Since then, it has grown to a 5-day per week, full day program.

The 2004-2005 school year began in August 2004 and ended in June 2005. It operated on a regular Alternative Education Program school year schedule consisting of 181 days and 1,104 hours of class time.

There were a total of 36 students enrolled in this school year. Eighteen (18) of those were classified as Alternative Education students (under 20 years old). There were nine (9) who earned credit towards a high school diploma.

Eighteen (18) Adult Education students (those over 20 years old) were enrolled: eleven (11) of whom earned credit.

The classes offered in the Jail Education Program include Math, Physical Science, Life Science, English, World History, U.S. History, Government, Health, Oral Communications, and an overview of computers.

Most students in the jail find that the lack of external distractions and a relaxed learning atmosphere is a good place to continue their education. Some even continue their education once they complete their sentencing terms.

...Crisis counseling and follow up contacts, particularly in domestic violence and sexual assault incidents

... Assistance in filing Crime Victim Compensation claims

...Office open weekdays from 8:00 A.M. – 4:00 P.M.

... Available through central dispatch 24 hours.

Tuscola County Victim Services is supported by Crime Victim

Work Site, Day Report and Substance Abuse programs saved the Tuscola County 3900 Jail bed days in 2005.
