Undersheriff Robert Baxter is the second-in-command of the Sheriff's Office, and in the absence of the Sheriff, he acts on his behalf. He has authority over all areas, but just as with the Sheriff, functions through the chain of command.

It is my privilege to present the 2025 Annual Report for the Tuscola County Sheriff's Office. This report highlights the accomplishments, challenges and progress made over the past year as we continue our commitment to providing professional, community-centered public safety services. This report provides a statistical snapshot of what our office handles on a day-to-day basis.

In 2025, we introduced Link, our newest K9 to our workforce. Deputy Webster and Link went through 7 weeks vigorous training to prepare for incident response. Community Corrections was up and running in September serving organizations throughout our community. We now have four employees certified in Child Passenger Safety Seat, a program that has not been active in over 10 years. Our corrections department saw full staffing with road well on its way to full staffing. We experienced the highest fatality numbers the county has seen in well over a decade. Our community involvement has been overwhelming. Our office participated in many parades, Faith in Blue weekend, school events, and many other community events.


Our Correctional Deputies are dedicated to providing safe, secure and professional services to our citizen detainees in the jail facility. Court Security Deputies continue to maintain and provide a safe environment and assist citizens at the court facilities. Our offenders lodged has been consistent over the past 5 years, while we did see an increase in female inmates.

In 2025, our calls for service continue to rise. Even being short staffed our deputies handled these calls with professionalism and integrity. Traffic crashes are in line with our five-year average.

Our county experienced increasing demands on law enforcement services. Our team responded with dedication and innovation, working to ensure that our strategies, training, and resources evolved alongside the community we serve. We remained focused on proactive policing, strong partnerships, and a clear vision for the future.

As we look back on the past year, I am proud of the professionalism and adaptability of the men and women of this agency. Their continued service to Tuscola County reflects the values of our organization and our shared commitment to public trust.

In 2023, Spencer became a K9 deputy. Spencer has received commendations for professional excellence, lifesaving and bravery.

Corrections Division

The Tuscola County Corrections Division maintains a high level of commitment, professionalism, and training to provide a safe and secure facility for the public, employees, and inmates. All Tuscola County Deputies are certified through the Michigan Sheriff's Coordinating and Training Counsel (LCOTS) as required by law. Tuscola County Correctional Facility is in full compliance with the "Administrative Rules for Jail and Lockups" as required by the Michigan Department of Corrections (MDOC).

In 2025, our Corrections Officers continued to demonstrate unwavering dedication, operating under challenging conditions while maintaining the highest standards of professionalism and integrity. These men and women serve not only as custodians of the jail but also as mentors, communicators, de-escalators, and crisis responders. They interact with a diverse and often vulnerable population and are trained to manage mental health concerns, medical emergencies, and behavioral challenges—all while upholding the rights and dignity of those in their care.

The division oversees inmate housing, intake and release procedures, classification, supervision, and courtroom transports. It also coordinates essential programs designed to reduce recidivism, including educational opportunities, substance abuse treatment, and mental health services.

Much like the Uniform Division patrols the streets, the Corrections Division patrols the halls of accountability, order and safety—ensuring that our jail operates with efficiency, compassion, and control.

What we do....

Responsibilities

The Uniform Division's primary responsibility to provide the highest quality of law enforcement service to Tuscola County citizens and visitors. This division is responsible for a wide range of functions, including road patrol, traffic enforcement, criminal investigations, accident response, and special event coverage. Uniformed deputies are often the first point of contact for the public; their professionalism, integrity, and dedication reflect the core values of our agency. Throughout the year, the division focused on enhancing community engagement and leveraging technology to improve service delivery. Our deputies underwent continued training to stay current with evolving threats, legal standards and best practices in modern policing.

Services

The Uniform Division is comprised of 1 Lieutenant, 4 Sergeants, 2 Detectives, 13 Deputies, Weighmaster, and 2 Drone Operators. We provide 24/7 law enforcement services to the community, responding to over 13,000 calls for service. The Uniform Division also provides specialized services such as Traffic Crash Investigation, Marine Patrol, Traffic Enforcement, Alcohol Enforcement, K-9 and more.




Community Corrections

The inmate work crew program is a shining example of how the Tuscola County Sheriff's Office turns accountability into opportunity. Administered through the Corrections Division, this program allow eligible inmates to contribute to the community through supervised work assignments that promote personal responsibility, skill development, and civic pride. Every participating inmate is screened and selected based on behavior, sentence type, and eligibility criteria to ensure the safety and success of the program.

In September 2025, Deputy Kyle Nordstrom was appointed to Community Corrections/Worksite. Due to lack of staffing, this position sat vacant for 10 months. In the short time that Deputy Nordstrom has taken over, his crew has completed work for the maintenance department, Wesleyan Woods, The Child Advocacy Center, Polish American Club, many local fire departments, roadside pickup and many more entities.

Deputy Nordstrom maintained 3 sections of Adopt-A-Highway which were done in the fall. They are M15 (Brown Rd to Murphy Lake Rd), M-46 (Sheridan Rd, to Ringle Rd.), M-25 (Bradleyville Rd to Quanicasee Rd.)

This year the program ran from September 27 through December 31. We assisted over 20 organizations. The worksite crew totaled 1312 hours of work.



Child Passenger Safety Program

This year re-introduced the Child Passenger Safety Program. The program lost grant funding in 2015. Between Tuscola County and Huron County, 20 people were certified. We were able to send four employees, in May, to the training to become certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPST). The training consisted of 40 hours of classroom and hands on applications. The CPST have yearly training they need to complete to stay certified. The benefits of having this program is being able to support families that may not have the resources to keep their children safe while they are in a vehicle. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) cite over 46% of car seats are installed incorrectly. We received 26 car seats from the state of Michigan. Since being certified 33 seats were inspected and 21 were replaced.



Tuscola County Marine Patrol

The Tuscola County Sheriff's Office is a full-service organization to the residents of Tuscola County. It provides Marine patrol to Saginaw Bay and several inland lakes. Sunset Bay Marina has provided us free docking for the past several years, which has been helpful.

With the help of Richville Conservation Club, who provided the venue, we held another boater safety class. We certified 24 people during that time.

In 2025, part time Marine Deputies patrolled a total of 205 hours. The Saginaw Bay was patrolled 175 hours, Murphy Lake and North Lake, totaled 29 hours. We issued 4 warnings for no floatation device and 3 for registration violations.




